#### Launch of Tartu Academy of Theology

After 50 years of Soviet occupation, Estonia regained independence in 1991. Recognizing the need for Christian leadership in the newly free nation, Pastor Eenok Haamer founded Tartu Academy of Theology (TAT) in 1992 with financial support from American Lutheran pastors. For over 30 years, TAT has trained hundreds of Christian leaders. Today, Pastor Eenok's son, Pastor Siimon Haamer, continues his father's mission, ensuring that theological education remains strong.

However, we soon realized that theological education alone was not enough. Estonia is one of the most secular countries in the world, and we saw the urgent need to go beyond education and actively share the Gospel. We needed to create a space for practical ministry, outreach, and community engagement. This vision gave birth to Home of Hope.

#### **Establishing Home of Hope Christian Outreach Center**

In 2018, we faced a defining moment—either shut down the ministry due to financial challenges or take a bold leap of faith. Our rented space was too small and deteriorating, and we lacked funds to expand. But we had something greater—a calling from God to do more for Estonia.

Trusting God, we stepped forward—just like Joshua at the Jordan (Joshua 3). Then, the impossible happened: in just six weeks, \$125,000 was raised to support our vision! With faith as our foundation, we made a down payment on a \$2.26 million dream, unsure how the rest would come.

And God provided. In December 2019, Home of Hope opened its doors—a continuation of TAT's mission and the Haamer family's commitment to Estonia's faith. Today, we see God's blessings beyond what we envisioned in 2018, and the ministry continues to grow.

In one of the world's most secular countries, we must keep faith alive. Home of Hope isn't just a building—it's a movement and a beacon of encouragement.

We still need \$492,419 to pay off the mortgage and fully secure Home of Hope.

# A LEGACY OF FAITH

The Haamer Family Story

#### **Background**

Estonia was occupied for 50 years after WW2 by the aggressive, atheistic Soviet Union. This regime tried to break our deep Christian roots. Unfortunately, they were guite successful. During the first 10 years of Soviet occupation, 2/3s of Lutheran pastors were killed, imprisoned, or forced to flee. Before WW2, 98% of Estonians were Christians; today only around 12% are members of different Christian churches. These broken connections must be restored.

We share with you a story of hope and trust—a testament to spiritual resistance, unwavering faith in God, and the sacrifices of one family over a century. It is also the story of the suffering endured by the Estonian people.



#### **Four Generations of Continuity**

1st generation: HARRI HAAMER (1906-1987), a Lutheran pastor, was arrested in the late 1940s and imprisoned for eight years in a Siberian slave labor camp because of his faith.

2nd generation: EENOK HAAMER (1935-2025), served as a Lutheran pastor for 61 years until his passing on February 27, 2025. After WWII, he was forced to hide in the forest for six years, living in an underground bunker because he was the son of a pastor. Later, he founded Tartu Academy of Theology, ensuring that Christian education continued in Estonia.

3rd generation: NAATAN, MARKUS & SIIMON HAAMER, Eenok's sons, are all Lutheran pastors. Despite the Soviet regime's hostility toward Christianity, they chose to follow in their father's and grandfather's footsteps. Silmon now leads Tartu Academy of Theology and Home of Hope, carrying forward the family's vision and legacy.

4th generation: MATTIAS HAAMER, son of Markus, joined Home of Hope's mission in 2020, bringing fresh energy and new ideas. At 27 years old, he represents the next chapter of the Haamer family's commitment to Christ in Estonia.

#### MAREK'S TESTIMONY

Alumnus of TAT, Coordinator of Bible School

I was born in 1976. It is said that the 70s were the most miserable period for the Church in Soviet-era Estonia. A large part of society had become estranged from the Church.

I grew up near a church, but its doors were rarely open. My parents saw no need to baptize their children. Only later did I learn that one of my grandmothers was praying for us, while the other taught me the Lord's Prayer. Even then, God was at work—He had not forgotten us.

In the early 1990s, much changed in Estonia. Suddenly, one could freely go to church and buy a Bible. One of my older brothers became a Christian and told me about Jesus. At first, I argued with him. But on my birthday in early 1995, we talked again. That night, he gave me a simple prayer—the sinner's prayer. Alone in my room, I read it. The next morning, I felt physically different, as if I had been made new inside. That summer, I told God I wanted to dedicate my life to the work of His kingdom.

That autumn, I began studying at the Tartu Academy, where I found my first Christian friends and a great spiritual mentor, Pastor Eenok Haamer. Just before Christmas in 1995, he baptized and confirmed me.

In 2003, I was ordained as a pastor in the Estonian Evangelical Lutheran Church. A few years earlier, I had married Pirjo, whom I met at TAT.

God's plans are greater than we can imagine.
